# **Other Updates:**

# Operational comments and general observations

#### Weather and other delays:

- Over the latest 24-hour period, the multipurpose terminal in Cape Town experienced delays for approximately two
  hours and 46 minutes due to rain and fog.
- Berthing delays at the container terminal in Cape Town have exceeded 13 days.

### Load-shedding:

· No load-shedding challenges were reported at any of our commercial ports over the latest 24-hour period.

# **Equipment Availability:**

#### Staging Areas Update:

Due to the national shutdown, low truck turnout is anticipated throughout the day. According to reports, a truck driver
was shot at this morning, causing widespread scepticism across the industry.

#### **Bottlenecks:**

• The congestion at Cape Town has worsened over the latest 24-hour period as the average berthing delay surpassed 13 days. Cape Town thus remains on the "Port Congestion Watch" as more than 43 000 TEUs are currently stuck at anchorage, with a queue-to-berth ratio at a high of 1.32.

# Corridor Update: No current updates

### Rail Update:

• No cable theft incidents or vandalism were reported over the latest 24-hour period by TFR, however, reports emerging from the RORO terminal in Durban suggested that one of the trains destined for the terminal was delayed due to cable theft.

#### Policy Updates:

• The industry should be reminded of the increased storage fees for the new financial year, which is set to be implemented from 01 April 2023.

## Other Updates: (National Shutdown, Monday 20 March).

- Both CTCT and CT MPT are fully operational and well-capacitated in terms of security. However, it should be noted that some of the main depots seem to be closed today while most of the main roads remain open.
- TNPA in Cape Town reported that they have 99% attendance from the workforce and are wellcapacitated in terms of security. So, for the moment, the impact of the national shutdown seems to be low

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
