Operational comments and general observations

Weather and other delays:

- Average time at anchorage for container vessels as of 06:00 this morning: Cape Town: 182 hours.
- Severe vessel ranging disrupted waterside operations at CTCT over the weekend. Of the three vessels at berth, two experienced severe ranging. One vessel lost the entire weekend while the other started ranging from 06:00 yesterday morning to 19:30 yesterday. The terminal attempted to work the vessel at 19:30 again; however, ranging started again from 20:00 to 08:00 this morning.
- The Maersk Sofia decided to "cut and run" the Port of Cape Town to maintain the rest of her schedule, while the Maersk Sheerness decided to omit the port after being delayed for around 17 days.
