



CONTAINER RECOVERY PLAN

06H00 | 7 DECEMBER 2023

In efforts to keep stakeholders informed regarding the Container Recovery Plan, Transnet is providing daily status updates on the performance of port and terminal operations.

As of 07 December 2023, there are a total of 22 container vessels at anchorage destined for the Durban Container Terminals. A total of 32 gangs have been deployed across the Durban, Nelson Mandela (NMB), and Cape Town ports. The Daily Container Recovery Plan Monitoring Session continues to find ways to alleviate container vessel congestion at the Port of Durban.

An operations report is below:

- In the last 24 hours, TPT has achieved 4516 moves at the Port of Durban.
- All other container terminals are berthing vessels on arrival and experiencing no challenges thus far.

The table below provides an overview of vessels at berth, anchorage, volumes handled, and the marine craft availability across the ports.

DEFINITIONS

Vessels @ anchorage	Vessel prevented by its dropped anchor from moving in sea conditions. This can be due to waiting for a berth, an order, on voyage charter or bunkering
Berth	A place on the quayside where a vessel is moored or secured; alongside a quay where a ship loads or discharges cargo.
Gang	Number of cranes used on a vessel alongside and its crane intensity or deployed resources (operators, stevedores, designated haulers etc)
Marine craft	A port mode of transportation used to assist in moving vessels
